### President's Message

#### **Trials and Tribulations**

While many of you may think that we have had a warmer than usual winter, others may describe it as unusual. It was definitely unusual in December when the Conways (and the general area) experienced significant rainfall and record flooding. That was the beginning of our 'trials'. The lower level of both the Salyards building and the Brown Church next door could not escape the damage. Since then our new Executive Director, Heather, has become intimately familiar with FEMA representatives, Town of Conway Inspectors, members of the building trades, and filing related government paperwork. All of this in the hopes of receiving some relief from these unexpected repair costs – the Saco rose to almost 19 feet, well above historical flood stages. All of this work was clearly not in Heather's educational background of Historical Preservation, but it has certainly been a learning experience for both her and your Board.

While saving numerous items from the Salyards, and continuing our de-accessioning of "not Conway related" items in the Eastman Lord House, your Board is hoping that income generated by a flood sale of these items will help offset our looming repair costs. We've set a date of July 13th to have a large tag sale (in cooperation with the Brown Church trustees) so we should have a large number of items to interest a great number of folks.

Now it is April and we start our summer program series of members' meetings on the second Tuesday of each month thru December. We'll begin our programs with a talk on the early newspapers of the area on April 9th. We'll have some light refreshments available, and if you wish to help with providing something for future programs just let us know. Additional program topics may be found on page 2 in this newsletter. All programs will be held at the Old Firehouse on Main Street om Conway Village, beginning at 7:00 P.M. Ample parking is available.

Our work on re-opening the Eastman Lord House continues, even as some window replacement, painting, and renewing some damaged outside trim work takes place—notwithstanding the deadlines for numerous FEMA documents to be filed on time. Inside, of course, we are still cataloging items found in our large collection of things. All of our north-facing storm windows need to be replaced later this summer, and that adds to our list of tribulations.

With any luck the snow will eventually melt and we can turn our attention to mowing the grass, cutting some brush out back, and attending to the flower beds in front of the ELH. If you would like to help in this regard please call Heather and let her know!! At this point I'm sure that we are all looking forward to warmer temperatures and 'the usual' spring showers.


Picture from Dedication of Conway Methodist Episcopal Church in 1886
